
Matthias, Apostle, Thursday, May 14, 2020

Matthias was the apostle added to the Twelve after Jesus' resurrection, as a replacement for the dead Judas Iscariot. He had traveled among the followers of Jesus throughout the Lord's ministry. Formerly commemorated on February 24, Matthias's celebration is moved to May 14 in agreement with most Western calendars.

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Are you feeling a hunger for Holy Communion?

Are you missing the Sacrament of the Altar? That would be a sign that your faith is healthy. But in order to resist the temptation to innovation, it may be helpful to consider the Church's teaching about Holy Communion. The Lutheran Confessions have very specific things to say about the Sacrament.

The initial focus of the *Augsburg Confession* is on justification by grace through faith. "To obtain such faith God instituted the office of preaching, giving the gospel and the sacraments" (V, dt. txt.). This Office of Ministry for the sake of the Church (that is, the office of the pastor) is established by God. A person is called by a congregation to fulfill the ministry God has given to the Church. Further, the one who is called is part of the larger Church, hence proper training, examination and accountability to the whole Church. "Concerning church government it is taught that no one should publicly teach, preach, or administer the sacraments without a proper [public] call" (XIV, dt. txt.).

But the issue is not merely about pastoral authority. It is about a witness to the world by the whole community called the congregation. As much as your pastor might like to have Communion more often, that is not done alone. "On holy days, and at other times when communicants are present, Mass is celebrated, and those who desire it receive the sacrament" (XXIV, dt. txt.). At the time of this writing (1530) Lutherans were still calling the Sacrament of the Altar "the Mass." The emphasis in this quote is on the phrase, "when communicants are present." The Latin text at this point continues, "For the ancient teachers before the time of Gregory do not mention private Masses, but often speak of the common Mass." Holy Communion is communion with God in Jesus Christ, but also a communion with the Body of Christ, the Church, made concrete in the congregation.

Luther gets the final and more forceful word from the *Smalcald Articles* of 1537. "If some want to justify their position by saying that they want to commune themselves for the sake of their own devotion, they cannot be taken seriously. For if they seriously desire to commune, then they do so with certainty and in the best way by using the sacrament administered according to Christ's institution. On the contrary, to commune oneself is a human notion, uncertain, unnecessary, and even forbidden. Such people also do not know what they are doing because they are following a false human notion and innovation without the sanction of Gods' Word. Thus it is not right (even if everything else were otherwise in order) to use the common sacrament of the church for one's own devotional life and to play with it according to one's own pleasure apart from God's Word and outside the church community" (II).

Along the Way

The underground railroad that saved the lives of countless enslaved husbands and mothers and babies tortured by America's original sin of slavery depended upon safe refuge along the journey to freedom—a place prepared.

Through desert dangers where thieves waited and beasts preyed in the night, weary travelers along the Silk Road took restful shelter in inns along their way—a place prepared.

From the dense streets of Kolkata, India, where poverty's scourges lie thick over crowds of people, and disease lingers in the sluggish air, humble compassion clad in white and blue saris gathers the wretched into a home for the destitute and dying—a place prepared.

Around the globe, in the midst of despair, people fleeing from war die in the sea, are lost in the desert, swarm at borders, scale walls, weep at fences, hang on trains, trudge every landscape imaginable hoping for a home at the end of a trail—a place prepared.

Jesus promised the most remarkable thing to his disciples: "I go to prepare a place for you" (John 14:2). And they asked, "Where? We don't understand! Show us!" Jesus' answer to his disciples does not offer a spiritualized road to heaven or a settled spot in Galilee, but it does offer all that matters: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). Jesus is the destination *and* the path. There is a refuge—a place prepared—in his love. The home of peace and safety that we all long for is found in Jesus. Jesus is with us all along the roads, streets, and alleyways, in places unseen and unknown. Jesus is with us, goes before us to prepare the place, and shows us the way.

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
