MOTHERS & FATHER IN THE FAITH (UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS)

Nicolaus Copernicus, died 1543; Leonhard Euler, died 1783; scientists – Sunday, May 24, 2020

These two men were both scientists who helped to explain the wonders of God's universe. Copernicus is best known for promoting the idea that the sun, not the earth, is at the center of our solar system. Euler was one of the founders of pure mathematics, and contributed to many other fields.

John Calvin, renewer of the church, died 1564 – Wednesday, May 27, 2020

Gifted both as a systematic theologian and as an interpreter of scriptures, Calvin embraced the Reformation, and as a preacher in Geneva, Switzerland, brought a theocratic government to it. He is regarded as the father of the Reformed churches.

Jiri Tranovský, hymnwriter, died 1637 -- Friday, May 29, 2020

Tranovský is considered to be the father of Slovak hymnody as well as an important reformer of the Slavic church. He translated the Augsburg Confession (the basis of Lutheran teachings) and published a collection of Slovak hymns.

All In-Person Worship Is By Reservation Only

Each week, Saint John Lutheran Church is **open for worship**, but only by reservation. We are trying to maintain a maximum attendance of ten at any worship service until the county's directions change. You must call Pastor Bond (608-208-0283) in advance, and reservations are "first-come, first-served." 24-hour-in-advance contact would be appreciated.

The pastor is the only one with the guestbook. Because you attended the previous week does not mean you are counted again for the next week, *unless* you contact Pastor Bond. Likewise, please let the pastor know as soon as possible if you have registered but cannot attend, so that your space might be available for someone else.

We are celebrating Holy Communion, with music accompaniment, regularly at 9:00 Sunday. If more than ten persons desire to attend at 9:00 a.m., a second worship time will be established on Sunday morning, but musical accompaniment is not guaranteed.

Jesus' Prayer

Decades beyond her early childhood, from time to time she repeats the bedtime prayer she has never forgotten: "Now I lay me down to sleep. I pray the Lord my soul to keep. Guard me, Jesus, through the night, and wake me with the morning light." What then follows is the threading of names, precious like pearls, on a string. "God bless . . . ," she begins, then lists mom, dad, grandmas, grandpas, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, all by name. Then teachers she liked, friends nearby and hungry children afar, the sick neighbor, the old man in the library, the blind lady at the post office, the lifeguard at the beach. Sometimes there is an "Amen," but often sleep comes first.

Jesus washes the feet of his disciples, shares a farewell meal with them, and teaches for the last time about his way of love. He promises again the presence of the Spirit and the coming of God's peace. Then, at the end of the day, he prays that God will be with his followers—and he prays for each of us. Jesus prays for his disciples, that they might know the love of God just as much as they know the real person of Jesus.

Jesus' prayer is also a prayer for unity. Jesus prays that we may be one just as he and God are one. Jesus prays, "All mine are yours, and yours are mine" (John 17:10). Following Jesus' example, we also may pray for the unity of all people with God, and the reconciling of peoples and all creation. We pray that what the world rejects God will receive. We pray that what the world divides God will make one. We pray that what the world threatens God will protect.

May we be comforted by Jesus' prayer for us, and may we be so emboldened to pray ourselves for the blessing, presence, and unity found in our risen Lord and Savior.

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
